Russell Stannard, the founder of www.teachertrainingvideos.com and the winner of 3 major educational awards. He was previously a Principal Teaching Fellow at the University of Warwick and the University of Westminster.

Making use of digitally generated content like video, screencasts, podcasts etc. to get the students to focus on the lower level thinking skills at home, so the teachers focus more on group work, pair work and homework in the class (hence the word 'Flipped'). It allows for more differentiation, incorporates a range of learning styles, and is more self-paced learning and supports independent learning essential for Post 16 students.
